PAST FIELD TRIPS



<u>Locust Grove – August 20 -</u> A group of 12 adventurous birders (9 members and 3 guests) spent a sunny but humid morning on August 20 walking the grounds of Locust Grove. Birds were not very active but 35 species were observed. Best species was probably a Cooper's Hawk.

An interesting closeup observation of another flying species was 2 very large and very beautiful Polyphemus moths seen on the grass along one of the trails. All had a good time.

<u>Cherokee Park – August 27 -</u> Five members and one guest enjoyed a pleasant morning in Cherokee Park. It was surprisingly quiet despite the cool front but we managed to find some nice migrants including six warbler species. I've led this trip for three years now and I looked back to see how this year compared to past years. Overall the 2021, 2022 & 2023 lists were very similar with 29, 31 and 33 species seen respectively. All three years we found only six warbler species but each year's list had a slightly different makeup. This year's highlights were an Eastern Kingbird, three Baltimore Orioles (neither often seen in the park), a beautiful Canada Warbler and several lovely Summer Tanagers. https://ebird.org/checklist/S148305287

Re-lump of Western Flycatcher
