PAST FIELD TRIPS



BREAKFAST WITH THE BIRDS – SEPTEMBER 9

BBC field trip, Breakfast with the Birds. Twenty-nine birders met at Hays Kennedy Park for a light breakfast and a birding field trip afterwards. Skies were cloudy with a light breeze and temperatures in the 70s.
Highlights included a Sora,

Highlights included a Sora two Semipalmated Plovers, Solitary and Pectoral Sandpipers,

along with a Blue-winged and a Green-winged Teal.

BBC field trip, Breakfast with the Birds. After breakfast and birding at Hays Kennedy, the group continued into Garvin Brown. There we were treated to a pair of juvenile Cooper's Hawks, a chipping Blue Grosbeak and a somewhat secretive Magnolia Warbler.

MAMMOTH CAVE NATIONAL PARK - SEPTEMBER 10, 2023 Beautiful weather and lots of migrating warblers made for a super fun day for the thirteen observers who traveled to the national park. Forty-eight species were recorded at the end of the day with a total of 14 species of warblers. Highlights included Wild Turkeys, Nighthawks,

Swainson's Thrushes, Cedar Waxwings, both Goldenwinged and Blue-winged warblers and a beautiful Canada Warbler. Join us on the next BBC field trip. You'll be glad you did! Thanks to Mary Cromer for the picture.

POPE LICK PARK- SEPTEMBER 24 BBC field trip.

Eleven birders met on the first fall morning of the year and the birds did not disappoint! We tallied 8 warblers, saw numerous Cedar Waxwings in the treetops and a beautiful Barred Owl, along with a Yellow-billed Cuckoo sitting low on an open branch. These were some of the highlights among the 57 species seen on the BBC field trip.

SEPTEMBER BIRDING

What a fabulous month to be out birding as we had a great migration of warblers, vireos, Broadwinged Hawks, flycatchers, etc. but of course the most important bird to visit our state was the American Flamigo, thanks to hurricane Idalia. A flamingo was spotted at Cave Rune State Park by campers but before any birders could arrive it flew off. But it was not long after that a report came in that there was one in Gallatin County just past Warsaw. So birders flocked to the overlook on highway 42 and spotted it just up the river. It than moved into little cove of the river up the highway from the overlook. So birders jumped into their car and drove up the highway to get a better look and did they ever. Here was the flamigo strolling down the street to give everyone fanastic looks before it flew back to the river where it has remained. It was still there as of September 25. Check birdky or ebird for updates.

There were many other birds to be seen throughout the month. Two hundred Broad-winged Hawks were seen at Turkey Run Park as they kettled and flew off south to continue their journey. Many warblers, vireos, thrushes, flycatchers were present in the Parklands, Caperton Swamp and even in your backyard. Wonderful collection of shorebirds were at the Fall of the Ohio. You still have a few days in October to catch some of the stragglers so join one of the field trips or go out on your own. Don't forget to use birdcast.info to find out when it is a good birding day and ebird to see what has arrive. Our winter residents are not for behind. So get out and bird, you won't regret it.
