DECEMBER PROGRAM

Join us on December 12 as Thom Barnell shares images and stories from his Fall 2022 trip to Southern Africa. With the dry season ending and vegetation

diminished, wildlife is more easily spotted as they frequent the remaining watering holes. Meanwhile South Africa's coast offers one of "the greatest wildflower shows on the planet" and was worth the trip alone.

Whenever I hear the "Aah-eeh-ah-eeh-aaaaah-eeh-ah-eeh-aaaah" call of Weissmuller's Tarzan, my childhood visions of Africa immediately come to mind. Hollywood dubbed the endemic Australian



Laughing kookaburra's call to frame their jungle imagery, except when they filmed in Florida or Louisiana. Then it was the Limpkin's call that warned of the lurking jungle dangers. Thank goodness Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom gave us actual footage, the sounds of Africa's wonders, and sometimes featured birds. But the true breakout of Africa's birds came with Disney's 1994 release of the Lion King, staring Zazu, the uptight, red-billed hornbill who was charged with keeping order within the kingdom.

From ABA's web site, South America is "the bird continent" with more species than any other landmass, But Africa is "the **birding** continent." Nowhere else are birds as brightly colored, abundant, and easy to see! The "Rainbow Nation" of South Africa offers the very best of the continent and harbors a large proportion of the planet's fauna and flora. It boasts the most regionally endemic bird species of any African country. With 846 bird species recorded, they include more than 160 regional endemics. Zazu is one of them!

PAST FIELD TRIPS

Sauerheber Unit of Sloughs WMA in Henderson County -October 28 Eleven people attended; cool, gray day in low 50s; band of showers interrupted things for about an hour early afternoon. We had a species tally in the mid-60s. With dry conditions in that part of the state for a couple of months and a broken pump, water for marsh birds was at a premium. We got skunked on rails as I was afraid, we might. Sparrows were in abundance but we had a tough time getting the whole group on some of the better birds. A Grasshopper Sparrow and probable LeConte's were the best found in Hardy Slough. Late in the day a few of us found at least one and probably two LeConte's in another area that used to be called the Woods Tract North along KY 268. Two Marsh Wrens were seen but we dipped on Sedge. I had scheduled the trip a week later than normal to avoid any conflicts with hunting seasons, so more waterfowl than normal were around. These included multiple flyover flocks of Snow Geese and Greater White-fronted Geese; one flock of Snows had a bird so small that we called it a Ross's. Also present were many dabbling ducks including Northern Pintail, American Wigeon, Green-winged Teal, and a few American Black Ducks. The gray day was not conducive to seeing raptors but we had at least a couple of Northern Harriers.

<u>Long Run Park – November 11</u>. Eighteen members and one guest met at Long Run Park on a cool and sunny fall morning. We started the morning with 7 species of waterfowl on the lake and a low flyover of an adult Bald Eagle. Other highlights included large groups of Common Grackles flying over and large kettles of Black and Turkey Vultures. We managed 42 species on this beautiful fall morning.

<u>Muscatatuck/Hardy Lake – November 19</u> Sunny skies, no breeze. Temps started in the high 20s rising to the low 60s by the end of the trip. BBC field trip, Part One. Discovery Pond area to auto

loop. Fourteen birders met at Muscatatuck NWR on a cold clear late fall morning. After birding at Discovery Pond area, we moved on to the auto tour loop for our second list and ended the morning enjoying lunch outside near the feeders. While the waterfowl were scarce, we got all seven of the winter woodpecker species and had good looks at Fox Sparrows and American Tree Sparrows.

Hardy Lake: Sunny skies, no breeze. Temperatures in the high 50s.

BBC field trip. Nine birders continued on from Muscatatuck to Hardy Lake to end the day of birding. Again, the waterfowl were scarce, but we picked up Buffleheads and Horned Grebes along with two Red-breasted Nuthatches.
