RESULTS OF GLOBAL BIG DAY

On our Global Bird Day here in Jefferson County, we started off with temperatures in the mid-50s, but as the day wore on with the light wind it became apparent temperatures were dropping slightly. In the afternoon the wind picked up fairly consistently, but all in all, everyone seemed to have a decent mix of birds on this mid-October day. Several areas did not get the coverage we should have had with many past participants unable to join, but 56 people worked very hard and found 101 species when all was said and done. Some of the highlights were Wigeon, Black duck, Red-breasted Merganser, American Bittern, 3 owls, Merlin, Marsh Wren, 12 species of warblers and Calvary Cemetery hosted 2 species of vagrant sparrows - Clay-colored and Lark! The cool weather had brought a few early winter residents in as well, with the highlights being a few Winter Wrens and juncos. Thank you to everyone that participated and logged all your data in ebird. Thanks to Michael Autin for organizing the Global Big Day.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

A major bird-collision event occurred in Chicago, Illinois, last week, killing nearly 1,000 migrating birds, the highest number on record. During the night and morning of October 4-5, the birds died after colliding into the McCormick Place Lakeside Center during the height of their annual <u>fall migration</u>. American Bird Conservancy (ABC) is calling for the management of McCormick Place to act now to prevent future bird collision tragedies, and for the Chicago City Council to fully implement the city's bird-friendly buildings ordinance. **Please join ABC in**

PAST FIELD TRIPS

HAYS KENNEDY/GARVIN BROWN, SEPTEMBER 30 The leader and 8 participants had a cool foggy morning that quickly gave way to clear, unseasonably warm, sunny skies. With no water in evidence the only waterbirds recorded were on the river and in-flight including Killdeer, Great Egret and Cormorant. The trail leading to the preserve was relatively birdy though birds were not especially cooperative in the tall vegetation, but we had Tennessee, Nashville and Yellowthroats in evidence as well as at least 3 Lincoln's Sparrows, a good number in the east. Some light 'marshing' yielded Swamp Sparrow and a single Marsh Wren that showed briefly for a few. The preserve was mostly quiet save for the constant darting robins and 1 nice flock of birds on the fence line facing Hays Kennedy that included Rosebreasted Grosbeaks, a Philadelphia Vireo, a Ruby-crowned Kinglet, several Redstarts and Baybreasted, Black-throated Green, Chestnut-sided, Tennessee, Nashville, and Magnolia Warblers. Some of our final additions were a family of Brown Thrashers, Black-and-White Warbler and White-breasted Nuthatch. Everyone worked hard to end the day with a respectable number at 57 species, with nary a Palm Warbler in sight...highly unusual.

CAPERTON SWAMP, OCTOBER 3- A beautiful, cool fall day greeted the 14 observers as they walked the trails at Caperton Swamp Park. It was slow at times but we eventually found 30 species including five species of warblers. Highlights included a late Blue-winged Warbler, hawking Cedar Waxwings, very cooperate Chestnut-sided Warblers, and beautiful Philadelphia Vireos. It was a fun morning to be out birding.

HAYS KENNEDY/GARVIN BROWN – OCTOBER 7 Nine members and 3 guests came out on the first day that has felt like autumn to look for migrants that may have wandered in with the recent cold front. Unfortunately we were left with a lack of large numbers or variety, but we did locate good numbers of sparrows including several Lincoln's and Swamp. Other highlights of the trip included a few Rose-breasted Grosbeaks, a young Red-headed Woodpecker, and decent numbers of Palm Warblers which seem to have arrived recently.



BECKLEY CREEK – OCTOBER 15 Fifteen birders met on a cloudy and chilly fall morning. In spite of less-than-ideal weather, the birds were still out and about. Highlights included several arriving winter visitors (White-throated and White-crowned Sparrows, Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker) and all seven winter species of Woodpeckers were seen.

BECKLEY CREEK – OCTOBER 21 On a chilly but sunny (and rapidly warming) morning, the trip began by covering the area around and north of the parking lot at the paddling access point, finding 20 species very quickly. Reversing course, we walked the paved path south as far as the bridge over the creek, taking a side trip through the field inside the big oxbow to the west of the road. It yielded, among other birds, three Red-tailed Hawks, including one under siege by American Crows, two Dark-eyed Juncos (FOS for most participants), a Belted Kingfisher and an Eastern Phoebe. Afterwards, the group split evenly among those returning to starting point via the paved path and those hiking the ridgeline trail instead. The species count ended at 40, with all of the expected woodpeckers except Pileated (Red-headed were much in evidence), both kinglets and swarms of Yellow-rumped Warblers, American Goldfinch and Carolina Chickadees. A most pleasant morning.

DRAUT PARK – OCTOBER 25 Ten members came out to Draut Park under overcast skies, with sun breaking through at times. Temps were milder, in the low 60's. Our trip started out rather slowly, with a few Mallards and Red-winged Blackbirds. We then saw 2 Coopers Hawks, giving an explanation as to the quietness of the birds. We finally hit a pocket near the creek where we encountered several first of season birds for some of us, including Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker, Yellow-rumped Warblers and both species of Kinglets, as well as several species of Woodpeckers. It then became quiet again. We did see both species of vultures after some of the participants had left at the very end. All in all we ended up with 30 species and had a great morning!

Have you ever thought about visiting a birding hotspot but didn't know anything about the property? Does it have paved trails, bathrooms, signposts? What birds can I see there and when? Are there any special access details or permissions required? *Importantly, have you ever wished you could provide other birders with such detailed information about your favorite birding location?*

There is a website designed to provide birders accurate, on-the-ground information about each eBird hotspot in an area, provided by local birders like you. For example, there are many hotspots that are on private property, and there are specific guidelines one must follow so as not to ruin access privileges granted by property owners who allow birders to visit conditionally.
