Past Field Trips

Anchorage Trail – October 27 Fifteen people (13 members, 2 non-members) ventured out into a cold morning to search for birds at the Anchorage Trail. Temperatures ranged from a brisk 45 degrees to around the low 60s and there was a slight to moderate breeze under a mostly sunny sky. Forty-two species were observed with highlights being multiple Hermit Thrushes and two Barred Owls.

Harrods Creek – November 3 45-68 degrees and sunny, wind SE at 7 mph. Thirteen members and



guests birded the Orange Trail at Harrods Creek Park on a cool, sunny morning. Highlights included at least 4 Pileated Woodpeckers flying over the trail and several irritated kinglets, both Golden-crowned and Ruby-crowned, showing their displeasure by raising their orange and red crowns respectively. Lots of roosting and soaring Black and Turkey Vultures were spotted. Two Brown Creepers were seen together. Several Swamp Sparrows mingled with Songs, Fields and White-throateds. Eastern Bluebirds and Cedar Waxwings were dining on mistletoe berries. A Bald Eagle soared into view as we returned to the parking lot.

Beckley Creek Park – November 7 Two members turned out on a gray but warm morning. Sparrows everywhere - mostly White-throated and Song, but slow otherwise. Highlight was a Red-headed Woodpecker near the creek.

Ohio River - Indiana Side - November 16

While we have been experiencing a rather slow November along the Ohio River, the 8 birders that joined the field trip along the Indiana side of the river got to enjoy at least a

few mixed rafts of waterfowl that included Ruddy Ducks, Redheads, Lesser Scaup, and Horned Grebes. We were also treated to good looks of immature Bald Eagles and distant Peregrine Falcons at several stops. While several of the birders on our trip got to see lifers throughout the day, the bird that proved to be new to half of our trip attendees was a Lesser Black-backed Gull at Falls of the Ohio.

Muscatatuck NWR/Hardy Lake – November 24 It was a beautiful day for the 20 members and guests who ventured to the refuge with a few continuing on to Hardy Lake. In all the group tallied 51 species but duck species were down and Sandhill Cranes were only heard in the distance. We



had many species of sparrows including American Tree Sparrows and Fox Sparrows. The group had all the woodpeckers except the Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. While watching Redheaded Woodpeckers a Winter Wren made its presence known by singing and skittering among the fallen branches. While eating lunch the Purple Finches entertained us at the feeders. Proceeding to Hardy Lake four loons were seen swimming and diving. A large raft of 198 Coots was feeding along the shore accompanied by two Redheads. And to top off the day the last remaining birders saw two Red-breasted Nuthatches moving around the evergreen trees.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

This year marks the 125th Christmas Bird Count sponsored by the National Audubon Society. Your participation is needed in one or more of these counts this year. The date for Louisville is listed below. The CBCs could change due to weather conditions so you should sign up to participate in case the compiler needs to contact you in the event there is a change. New participants should contact the compiler. **See birdky.org for other CBCs in the state**.

If you can't participate in the Louisville CBC, consider being a feeder watch counter. If you live in the count area all you need to do is count the birds that come to your feeder. There are protocols for counting the birds. Please let James Wheat know you will count the birds at your feeder and get the details of how to participate.
